Looking Back at 2017



Improving soil health continued to be a priority of the District in 2017. Many thanks to Governor Carney and the General Assembly for providing Conservation Cost Share funding for cover crops and other conservation practices. We also thank our partners at USDA and at DNREC for their support of financial and technical assistance programs that improve New Castle County. The combined efforts of NCCD, USDA

NRCS, and DNREC support the needs of the agricultural and urban/suburban landowners in the

county. These needs include soil health, nutrient management, water quality and drainage issues, and tax ditch maintenance.

NCCD hired an urban agricultural coordinator using a grant provided by the National Association of Conservation Districts and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service. The District also provided education

and outreach through public events, school programs, and our continued support of the Delaware Envirothon, an environmental program for high school students.

As we enter 2018, the District is looking for ways to expand the support of improving soil health among our farmers and producers. The NCCD Board and staff are here to serve and assist the citizens of New Castle County.

Awards and Recognition

The John R. Stinson and Sons mushroom farm in Hockessin received the Governor's Agricultural Conservation Award for their installation of a 257,000 gallon rinse water storage tank and heavy use protection area for their mushroom compost. The Delaware City Refinery and the town of Delaware City were honored with the Urban Conservation award for the Dragon Run Tide gate Repair Project. David H. Daniels Sr. and his father David R. Daniels were recognized as the 2016 Cooperators of the Year while George Whitehead was selected as the 2017 Cooperator of the Year. The Cooperator of the Year award recognizes local farm producers for outstanding conservation practices.

The District provided cost


share funds to 10 urban and community garden projects as a match for their receipt of micro-grants from the state Department of Agriculture. The Board also approved funding for 6 farm producer projects for water quality and erosion control.



The District rents three drills/seeders for use by landowners. A total of 381.3 acres of crops and pasture were planted by producers and growers.

The District investigated 126 requests for assistance during FY 2017 while the survey crew provided assistance on 44

drainage projects. As a delegated entity for the



The District approved cost share assistance to 10 urban/suburban landowners with smaller-sized drainage and erosion control issues.


