## University of Delaware Extension

This website helps walk you through indentifying plant disease through an online key and has a small list of publications related to pests/disease in the garden. More importantly it connects you with the UD Master Gardeners, a group of educational volunteers that work with UD Cooperative Extension to help members of the public. This website is pretty robust including categories on pollinators/beneficals, wildlife, disease, environmental factors, and insects. The information found in these categories contain good quailty photos, symptoms, as well as a few solutions. ## University of Minnesota Extension

What's great about this site is that it walks you through the process of identifying your problem, by having you click on a series of pictures. So if you have no idea on what is wrong with your plant, this is a good place to start. They also have a collection of publications that discuss pests/diseases that are organized by crop type which could be useful when creating a list of potential problems during garden planning. Added bonus- its the only website that also has a section on identifying weeds!
